Heartworm

Heartworm disease is a serious and potentially fatal condition in dogs and cats that is transmitted by mosquitos. Because we tend to notice mosquitoes mostly during warmer months, we mistakenly consider heartworm only a summertime threat. Pet owners, take notice: heartworm disease can affect our pets at any time, even during winter months, which is why it is important to continue preventative treatment all year.

Veterinarians recommend an annual blood test that detects the presence of heartworms (in addition to three tickborne diseases) so that your pet can be treated, ideally, before showing any clinical signs of the disease.

Fortunately, a monthly pill or topical solution, prescribed by your veterinarian, can be given to dogs and cats to prevent heartworm disease. Falmouth Veterinary Hospital recommends Sentinel, Heartgard Plus, or Revolution for heartworm and internal parasite prevention.

Mosquitoes can live in your house for an extended period of time, and you can never be sure exactly when they will die in the cold or return in the spring. If your dog or cat is bitten by a mosquito during the spring or summer months, the heartworms will continue to grow well into the winter months; hence, the need to continue preventative treatment!

Stay one step ahead of this potential threat: protect your pets from heartworm disease by limiting exposure and by providing preventative treatment year-round, even during these chilly months.
